### Member Q&A with Christine Cowan

Dedicated NSWA board member and newly self-published author Christine Cowan accomplished her bucket list goal of writing a novel after retiring from a career in teaching and counselling. The dynamic plot for her debut novel, She Thought I Knew, evolved from a disturbing incident at her job, and the layers of conflicts and subplots came from a lifetime of reading, attending creative workshops, and listening to the advice of successful authors.



#### Tell us a bit about yourself.

I grew up in Vancouver and moved to the North Shore for my career. In addition to my teaching degree, I have a master's of psychology that provided me with insights on human behaviour and helped with creating a suspense novel. I have won prizes from local writing contests in poetry and non-fiction, and I am currently writing my second novel. I am also a painter and belong to the North Shore Artists' Guild.

#### Why did you choose to self-publish?

I chose to self-publish because writing a novel (and finishing it!) was on my bucket list. I wanted to get it in front of readers as quickly as possible and be able to say I had done it. Now that I am now working on my second book, I plan to try the traditional publishing route.

Your novel is a thriller set on the Sunshine Coast. What is your connection to this beautiful part of BC? We had a cabin on the Sunshine Coast, and I still visit there often. My second novel is also set on the Sunshine Coast, but the plot is unrelated to the first novel.

One reviewer described your novel as having "a deceptively intricate plot and engaging main character." What insights can you offer about your creative process?

The plot idea came from an event at my job and built from there. I explored themes and what we can learn from them. My characters are an amalgam of friends and people I've met with bits of myself in there, too.

#### What childhood book made an impression on you?

The Secret Garden by Frances Hodgson Burnett. Even as a child I was interested in wounded people and underdogs.

You have served on the NSWA board for almost a decade. Thank you! What does the NSWA offer you? I love to talk to others who feel the same excitement about writing that I do. The association attracts a wonderful mix of people and has great speakers and programs of interest.

## Playwright Jill Daum's Words Lusciously Devoured By All

The North Shore Writers' Association was thrilled to have Jill Daum, Actor and Playwright for over 40 years, as our guest in the Speaker Series in January. Jill is one of the co-creators, co-writers and performers of internationally acclaimed Mom's the Word trilogy, which was seen all over the world, by millions of people and translated into a multitude of languages. She recently wrote a play on her own, Forget About Tomorrow about her experience with her husband (John Mann's) early onset Alzheimer's Disease, a love story which tells the tale of a relationship rocked by a devastating disease. Jill was humorous, engaging, genuine, and provocative as she performed from three of her plays, Mom's the Word, Forget About Tomorrow, and a new one that is in the works about her son who has been diagnosed with Schizophrenia.

In our conversation, Jill was humorous and generous about her writing process. Writing a play wasn't something she had considered until one of her actor friends had engaged her and a few other actor friends about the experience of having a baby and being a new mom. Jill discovered a love of writing about her life with humour and authenticity. And it hit the sweet spot. All the women of *Mom's the Word* accentuated their authentic experiences as new moms and it catapulted the show not only locally here in Vancouver, but nationally and all over the world.


Jill had always utilized a writing/acting group to formulate the *Mom's the Word* plays, but then she found herself on her own to write *Forget About Tomorrow*. She joined a different writing group and was able to flush it out, and with the help of a Dramatron, which in the more traditional publishing world is like an editor, she was able to bring it to fruition to the stage in live theatre. It was the first time she had written alone, written what she calls "fiction" and not acted in her own creation. She utilized the elements of character development, plot, tension, scenes, pacing, and dialogue to bring it all to life.

Jill is currently in the process of writing a play about her son's condition of Schizophrenia, part of which she also graciously performed for us. Although she shared that she is struggling to find the humour in it, which is her calling card, I'm sure she will.

Those of us in attendance lusciously devoured every word Jill spoke and performed. We are so grateful for Jill's performances and sharing of her writing experience and process as a playwright. I can't wait for her next play!

On Monday, February 26, we'll welcome Canadian broadcaster, musician, and best-selling author Grant Lawrence for another fascinating Speaker Series.

## The Last Page by Cathy L. Scrimshaw

These days I think a lot about the passage of time.

It's been one of those winters. My husband had major surgery in November. All eventually went well, but we had to wait weeks for the news after waiting months for the surgery. Time crawled during those periods. In early January, I attended a funeral for a cousin who was younger than I am now, and on the same day was told that another cousin, again younger than I, has an aggressive form of cancer. A few days later my father's doctor had the talk with me, about end-of-life issues. Decisions will have to be made soon, and while other members of the family will weigh in, it will be my responsibility to make the call when that time comes.

All this reminds me that time is marching on much faster than I'd like it to. And that time is something we never have enough of. We can't stop the changes time brings. We can never have enough time to spend with family and friends. To accomplish all our goals. We can never know when our time will run out.

What does this have to do with my writing?

Strangely enough, all these endings, while not welcome, have not depressed me. They have galvanized me to do more. More of everything that matters to me. Especially where writing is concerned.

In the same months these events have taken place, I've completed three online writing courses, written hundreds of words most days and am near completion on a submission for an international novel-writing contest. I've journaled daily, read several books, both fiction and non-fiction, and joined a library-sponsored book club.

Writing and reading have always been an important part of my life. Writing has always been a way of sorting out my thoughts, even when I'm writing fiction. Reading the words of others, especially poets and songwriters, has brought both comfort and inspiration. Novels have given me an insight into other lives, other realities. Together, writing and reading make the cycle and seasons of life, and the passage of time, easier to cope with.

I like to think my experiences with the upheavals of the past few months will make my writing richer. More interesting. Maybe even more saleable.

So, I'll continue on the writer's path. It will be interesting to see where I end up.
